

UNFORESEEN WEATHER RAINED DOWN ON OUR REGION

The fall and winter months of 2016-2017 brought with it some unforeseen challenges, including a wildfire season and unprecedented snow and rainfall not seen in nearly 100 years. In October, as the Little Valley Fire sparked, the Truckee Meadows Fire Protection District along with Washoe County and other partner agencies fought to keep citizens safe, set up evacuation sites, and worked around the clock to fight

what would grow to engulf over 2,200 acres of Washoe Valley. Just months later, two federal states of emergency were declared in January and February of this year, due to record snowfall and 16 atmospheric rivers pouring into the Northern Nevada region and hitting the entire West Coast. Our team worked together to provide life and structure protection, flood mitigation, snow removal, sandbag distribution and more.

NEW MEDICAL EXAMINER FACILITY

January 18, 2017 marked an exciting day as the new, state-of-the-art Washoe County Regional Medical Examiner facility was unveiled to the community. Since the original construction in 1959, the Medical Examiner's Office was in need of an expansion and renovation while they worked diligently to serve an

expanding population and a caseload than has more than doubled since 2007, while also serving 18 additional counties. Built on Washoe Countyowned land, the new site was constructed for \$10.77 million and was paid for by the Washoe County Capital Improvement Program. In addition to the new Medical Examiner's Office equipped with modern capabilities to better serve citizens, it was also designed to help ease the potential grief when visiting the office, with the new building offering two rooms specifically designed for meeting with decedents' families.







A BALANCED BUDGET IMPACTS

With the 2016-17 fire and flood incidents hitting our community, and our budget, this 2017-18 budget serves to fund the repairs and recovery associated with these disasters. Despite these unforeseen circumstances, we are proud that our budget is once again balanced. In addition, we are able to add 14 new positions and expand our programs by \$3 million.



Since June of 2016, Washoe 311 has received **4,389** customer service requests

We've all been there – we've reached the wrong department and are being re-routed...again. As a government entity that prides itself on excellent public service, we wanted to change this conversation, literally.

More than a call center, Washoe 311 is a customer service center, the hub of Washoe County that aims to serve our residents by providing accurate, helpful information they need 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.



With a county as large as ours, covering 6,600 square miles, our goal was to make getting the information our community needs as easy as dialing 3-1-1. With the launch of Washoe 311, the information embedded into dozens of county departments and divisions - including everything from finding out what time the summer concert series begins, where and how to pay property taxes or where to get a marriage license, to what the Senior Center is serving for lunch - is now centralized into

those three easy numbers or with the click of an email.

With plans to grow Washoe 311 in the coming years and expand our customer service capabilities, we will continue to work together with our residents, to make living in Washoe County even better.

Safe, Secure & Healthy Communities

CHILD ADVOCACY ACHIEVES ACCREDITATION

We are passionate about protecting our most vulnerable, which is why the Washoe County Child Advocacy Center is an innovative and critical part of what we do. A collaborative program under the Washoe County District Attorney's Office, the Washoe County Child Advocacy Center provides direct services to victims of child abuse. Set in a friendly environment where law enforcement, child protection, prosecution, mental health, medical services and victim advocacy can work together to help children heal from abuse and hold offenders accountable.

In February of 2017, the Washoe County Child Advocacy Center was awarded accreditation by the National Children's Alliance (NCA) after an extensive application and site review process. As the accrediting agency across the nation, NCA awards levels of accreditation and membership to centers that respond to allegations of child abuse in effective and efficient ways that put the child first. Washoe County is excited to share the Washoe County Child Advocacy Center received the highest-level of accreditation possible.





Since opening in 2014 over 1,200 forensic interviews of children have been conducted. In 2015, the Child Advocacy Center introduced on-site crisis counseling through grant funding. In 2016, over 600 counseling sessions were provided to children who were victims of abuse – with no cost to their families. In addition, the Washoe County District Attorney's Office secured 60 life sentences for child predators with the aid and participation of the multidisciplinary team approach to these cases.

WASHOE COUNTY LEADERSHIP PROGRAM

Creating a culture of "how can we help?" and "yes, we can!" is the heartbeat of the Washoe County Leadership Program. By working to create an excellent public service experience with our community, this first starts with each and every person who calls themselves a Washoe County employee. This is where the Leadership Program was born. As a vision from the County Manager, through the Leadership Program, employees expand skills, are empowered to bring ideas to fruition and have an opportunity to lead a program or event. With the development of five committees: Events, Recognition, Employee Communication, Giving & Volunteering and Leadership & Training, employees are free to contribute to a Committee they feel most passionate about.

One of the ways the vision of this program has made a tangible difference in the community is through the Lemmon Valley Donation Drive, led by the Washoe County Giving & Volunteering Committee. After the devasting flooding in the first half of 2017, the committee was compelled to help. They worked with the community at large to put out the call for donations from household supplies, hygiene items, clothing, food and gift cards. The response was tremendous, at the end of the donation drive the committee raised over \$10K in gift cards, 14 pounds of water and pet food, and 15K pounds of clothing.
