May Arboretum Report

HIGHLIGHTS

- Kristen's Garden upgrade (paver project) began this month. Funds were provided by a generous donation from the May Arboretum Society. \$35,000.00.
- A potting shed was installed adjacent to the Arboretum greenhouse. Funding was provided by the May Foundation. \$5,724.90.00.
- John Crandell Tree Service began work this past month. They are contracted to prune several large trees and remove noxious and invasive tree species. Funding for this project was made possible the May Foundation. \$8,000.00.

May Arboretum Educational Programs

- Danielle Ornelas, Arboretum Educator and AmeriCorps member held the "Little Sprouts" program this past month, "Animals Under The Snow." Over 25 people attended, parents and children. The series ends in February with "Backyard Spiders". The classes filled the first month it was offered. Workshops are designed for families with children ages 2-5. The program will assist young children practice motor skills, socializing, and decision making through activities and garden explorations. This series is FREE and open to the public. - The Arboretum Educator also reformatted and rebranded the Arboretum Naturalist program. She revised the program into two guides, the Jr. Naturalist guide and Naturalist Guide. She also developed a new patch for those children who complete the guide. The Jr. Naturalist Guide is for ages 10 and younger, and our Naturalist Guide is for ages 11 and older. Activities are designed to encourage a sense of wonder, mystery, and scientific discovery in nature. Once the guide is complete, we are requesting participants to mail their completed guide to the May Arboretum along with \$1 to pay for Wilbur's Naturalist Patch and postage.







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Greenhouse Program

The Horticulturist kicked off the greenhouse school program and will be piloting the program using several elementary schools and one high school. The arboretum is offering schools an opportunity to order FREE vegetable <u>starts</u> from our greenhouse this spring to meet the needs of the school science curriculum. This program will assist teachers with an opportunity to meet STEM requirements as well. Schools are emailed the arboretum greenhouse order form. Orders will be received through the end of January 2018. The form includes a selection of different vegetables suited for our environment and transplant well. Soon after the program was released to the selected schools the arboretum received 3 orders and we are expecting more. Order deadline is January 31st. All of our plant varieties are tried and true and grown from seed. Seedlings will be started in plug trays and transplanted into 4 inch pots and grown for an additional 3 to 4 weeks. All schools are required to pick up their orders at the Arboretum lath house at their requested date. The vegetables compiled are known to transplant well and produce in our short growing season with proper care. Also listed on the form for teachers are suggested local outdoor planting and frost free dates.

Tours



The upgrade includes an English recirculating fountain to serve as a focal point, new planter area, steps, new circular pavers, stair lighting and up-lighting in trees. The horticulturist proposed several bids to the May Arboretum Society in December. The Society awarded the bid to the Garden Shop. Construction will begin fall of 2018. Many thanks to the May Arboretum Society for their generous donation towards the project - \$45,000.00

• Staff was busy install a new irrigation system for the greenhouse, leaf removal, pruning, monitoring and cleaning irrigation ditches.

Wilbur D. May Arboretum Volunteers


